Africa Analysis: Don't reject R&D measures too quickly

The publication in May of the first African Innovation Outlook, charting the investment of 19 African countries in research and innovation, was a landmark event because of the lack of hard data for these activities. But the project also raised questions about how best to measure the success of science and innovation in boosting social and economic development on the continent. Some have challenged whether the indicators measured by the Outlook — in particular, those used to capture research and development (R&D) performance — tell us anything of value about whether R&D activity has tangible benefits for Africans.

Seacom claims world 1st with 500GB/s

Cable operator and broadband services provider Seacom and US-based digital optical networking equipment supplier, Infinera, claimed a world first on Monday by successfully trialling five 100 Gigabit per second (100Gb/s) channels of coherent optical transmission over a distance of 1 732km. The 500Gb/s trial was run over and looped back across Seacom's newly built 930km Dark Fibre Africa (DFA) fibre route which links the Seacom Mtunzini cable landing station in KwaZulu-Natal to the Teraco datacentre in Johannesburg.

Country's First Five Media Libraries to Open in 2012

Financing for submarine cable project finalised

The loan agreement for the financing of the Seychelles East Africa System (SEAS) – the high-power submarine cable system that will significantly improve broadband internet connection – has been finalised. The agreement was signed between AfDB (African Development Bank) and SCS (Seychelles Cable Systems Ltd.). The loan will partially fund the 1,930km submarine fibre optic cable from the main island of Mahé, from Beau Vallon beach, to the existing Eastern Africa Submarine Cable System in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania.
