BRICS to look at bid for top World Bank job

The world's major emerging economies on Saturday rejected the tradition that an American automatically is selected to head the World Bank and they will look at putting forward their own candidate for the open job. Finance chiefs from the BRICS group of emerging market powerhouses - Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa - met on the sidelines of a G20 meeting in Mexico City and agreed the top World Bank job should be open to all countries.

Region Eager to Benefit From Carnegie Mellon University

According to the Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) annual report 2009-2010, the latest report, some 596 foreign students, including 337 male and 259 female, were studying in Mauritius in 2010, a majority of which, or some 577 (96.8%) were enrolled on full-time programmes. The students were concentrated in 18 institutions: 85 students in 3 public-funded institutions; 450 students in 15 private post-secondary educational institutions; and a regional institution namely the Institut de la Francophonie pour l'Entrepreneuriat (IFE) with 61 students.
